Plastic-Free Design Requests Across All Quotes

In response to customer preferences, we embedded a consistent requirement into our procurement process: every packaging quote from suppliers must include a plastic-free option. This has led to a greater uptake of recyclable and fibre-based materials across our product ranges.

Material Reduction Through Simplified Packaging

For various stationery and gift items, we reviewed existing packaging and removed unnecessary structural or decorative elements, reducing material usage and simplifying the components to improve recyclability. Feedback-Driven Continuous Improvements

We closely monitored retailer feedback, particularly from key partners such as ALDI, to trial and adapt new sustainable packaging formats in line with both regulatory and consumer expectations.

Customer-Specific Requirements

While many customers request sustainable solutions, they also have varying guidelines and expectations for packaging performance, appearance, and testing compliance (e.g. rub testing, structural strength). Meeting these can restrict flexibility when trialling new materials.

APCO Action Plan Commitments

Criteria 1:

Governance & Strategy:

This criteria considers actions to integrate packaging sustainability into business strategies.

Design & Procurement:

This criteria considers actions taken to ensure that sustainability principles are considered in the design or procurement of both new and existing packaging through use of the Sustainable Packaging Guidelines (SPGs).





• Use the Sustainable Packaging Guidelines to review our packaging to identify opportunities for improvement.

Criteria 3: Recycled Content:

This criteria considers actions taken to increase or optimise the amount of recycled material used by your organisation.

- Develop a policy or procedure to buy products and/or packaging made from recycled materials.
- Aim to use recycled materials in any packaging where this is feasible, including:
 - Primary packaging
 - Secondary packaging
 - Tertiary packaging

Criteria 4: Recoverability:

This criteria considers actions taken to improve the recovery of packaging at end-of-life and increase use of reusable packaging.

• Investigate whether all of our packaging is recyclable at end-of-life and identify any gaps and opportunities for greater reuse or recycling.

Criteria 5: Disposal Labelling:

This criteria considers the extent to which packaging has been labelled to help consumers determine what to do with packaging at end-of-life.

• As packaging is updated or refreshed, add on-pack information for consumers on recyclability or correct disposal.

Criteria 6: On-site Waste:

This criteria considers progress in increasing the amount of on-site solid waste being diverted from landfill.

• Develop a system to collect and recycle used packaging generated at our facilities.

Problematic Materials:

This criteria considers the extent to which organisations are actively phasing out problematic and unnecessary single-use plastic packaging and preventing/reducing litter.

- Undertake the following to help reduce the impact of litter:
 - Conduct regular clean-ups on-site
 - Look for opportunities to redesign packaging to eliminate components that may have the propensity to become litter

Further commitments:
